SISTINE STALLONE

Since making her debut as a *T&E* Modern Swan in 2016, Sistine Stallone—who is signed as a model with IMG—has worked with such photographers as Inez & Vinoodh, walked the runway for Chanel, and shot campaigns for Dolce & Gabbana. Now, after a year of living in New York City, the 20-year-old is moving back to her hometown of L.A. this fall to begin college. For her that includes staying away from social media minefields. “I keep my opinions to myself. I’m neutral—like Switzerland.”

KIT KEENAN

When Kit Keenan set out to create her own line of clothes, she sought guidance from her mother, designer Cynthia Rowley, but she made a point of doing all the labor herself—from sketching to manufacturing to creating a website. “I really wanted to put my hard work into it,” she says. The brand, called KIT (for Keep It Together), launched this summer with the promise that every collection will be entirely different from the last. All-white dresses one season might be followed by athletic wear the next, for example. Keenan was inspired by the way her friends dress.

“It’s the story of someone whose style can’t fit into one box,” she says. Business aside, Keenan, who was raised in New York City and is currently studying film at USC, considers her mom her best friend—and a partner in crime. Their adventures have included surfing giant waves, scuba diving, and traveling to Iceland and Peru. “We’re quite a dangerous match,” she says.

“Barry Jenkins called me at nine o’clock in the morning,” Kiki Layne says. “He woke me up—and then I found out that I got it.” The 21-in-question is a leading role in *If Beale Street Could Talk*, director Jenkins’s follow-up to his Oscar-winning *Moonlight*, due out in limited release in November. In her big screen debut—an adaptation of James Baldwin’s novel—the 26-year-old Cincinnati native plays Tish, a woman trying to get her husband out of jail before the birth of their child.

It was just the kind of role that Layne, who earned a degree in acting from DePaul University, had been hoping for. “When I read Baldwin’s book, I knew I absolutely had to get this,” she says. “It’s a beautiful love story, and a role like this doesn’t come around often.”

Next up will be a part in *Native Son*, the film based on Richard Wright’s novel and written by Suzan-Lori Parks. After that, anything is possible. “I could do comedy, action, or even science fiction,” Layne says. “The only thing I’m sure of is that I want to keep doing work that speaks to me.”

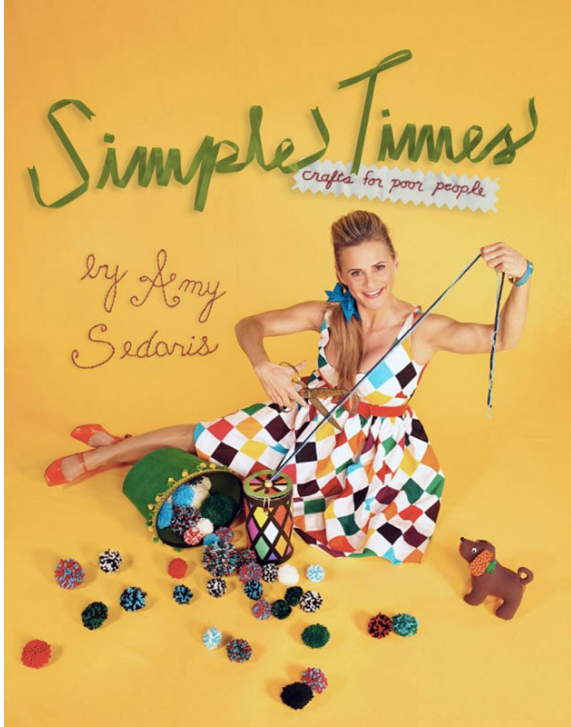

Laura Linney
The Hollywood actress talks to TOM SHONE about becoming a mother at the age of 49 and the mysterious world of Sherlock Holmes

“It has changed over time,” says Laura Linney when I ask her about how she is perceived in Hollywood. “When I first got out of Julliard, there was a lot of comments that I was ‘cold’. Then there was the ‘intelligent but wounded’ phase. Then there was the ‘morally decent person’. What else? ‘Thinking man’s sex symbol...’ There was that.”

None of this is said with the slightest sense of objection or protest—rather, amusement. The 51-year-old actress has the droll, sympathetic manner of a veteran novelist: the kind of woman you might talk to all

That wisecrack in the first act about needing earmuffs to listen to the Beatles? Makes us cringe every time. And that skimpy baby blue terry-cloth jumpsuit Sean Connery slips into while lounging poolside in Miami Beach? We're pretty sure that outfit looked ridiculous even back in 1964. Nevertheless, as you'll soon see on the following pages, *Goldfinger* is EW's choice for the greatest Bond movie ever made. Flaws and all. • Of course, Bond films are like diamonds in another way—they're forever—which is why we're bothering to rank all 20 official 007 movies in the first place. It's not merely that new ones keep popping up—the 21st, *Casino Royale*, with Daniel Craig as the latest Bond and Eva Green and Caterina Murino as the Bond girls, just arrived (see our review on page 79)—but that the old ones never die.

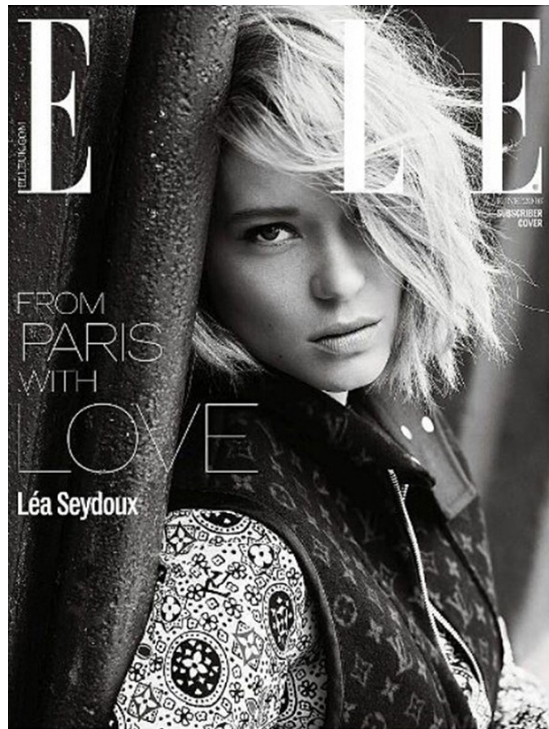
